


IN MEMORIAM

Dr. William "Bill" Herrold, Professor Emeritus at UNF and Past President of both the Duval County Reading Council and the Florida Reading Association, passed away on August 23, 2018 following a brief illness.

Multisensory Learning for All Students

Legacy North 2

Dr. Mary E. Little is known for her expertise in Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports and is a Professor in Exceptional Student Education at UCF. She has worked in schools as a secondary teacher, Co-teacher, program coordinator, and principal. She is author of Response to Intervention (Rtl) for Teachers: Classroom Instructional Problem Solving.

Dr. Enrique A. Puig is known internationally for his expertise in literacy acquisition and instruction. He teaches content area reading and diagnostic reading at UCF. Enrique has authored numerous curriculum materials, articles, chapters, books, and training materials. He is co-author of The Literacy Coach: Guiding in the Right Direction.

ABSTRACT:

During this interactive, transdisciplinary institute participants will gather wisdom from colleagues from across the state in education by investigating and examining the language processing requirements of proficient literacy acquisition and the environmental, cultural, and social factors that contribute to becoming literate. Through a multimedia approach, participants will engage with perspectives on moving from projects to system-wide improvement, preparing for systemic improvement, embracing research-proven frameworks and policies, and developing a culture of continuous improvement within schools and organizations, in addition to reviewing teaching reading in preventative, intervention, with remedial settings to improve data interpretation to shape multisensory instruction. As well, participants will engage in developing a critical understanding of reading difficulties, including dyslexia, on a continuum of severity.

The Role of Culturally Relevant Literature in the Literacy Lives of Students Legacy South 3

Dr. Taylar Wenzel is a faculty member at the University of Central Florida, where she teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in elementary and secondary education. She is the founder and co-director of the UCF Enrichment Programs in Literacy and the director of the UCF Downtown Saturday Reading Camp, both of which offer intervention and enrichment opportunities to serve K-6 students in the Central Florida area. She is a consultant for the Center for the Collaborative Classroom.

Sheila Roberts-Veatch has over 30 years experience as a classroom teacher, state assessment project manager, governmental education liaison, and district literacy coordinator. Her work in international schools (Papua New Guinea and Kenya) provided experience in the application of literacy strategies in multilingual and multicultural classroom settings. Sheila holds a BS in Elementary Education from Florida State University and an EdM in Early Childhood Education from the University of South Florida.

ABSTRACT:

The use of multicultural and diverse literature in the instructional setting has been the focus of a range of research, especially as classrooms reflect more diversity nationwide. By 2020, 50 percent of the students in our schools will be minorities, supporting the necessity of culturally relevant literature in classrooms that reflect demographic realties; in Florida, that is already the case. Educators must be aware of the important role multicultural, diverse literature plays in the reading and writing lives of their students and to make the necessary changes. This session will address both concerns.

Recent events have emphasized the need to continually build classroom cultures supportive of all learners in socially responsible environments. To do this effectively, teachers must be aware of how often their daily instruction incorporates diverse texts, be equipped to evaluate texts in a sound way, and be able to implement effective instruction that strengthens reading and writing through the use of diverse texts. This session will provide the tools necessary to evaluate texts based on current research and best-practice strategies. Participants will review and reflect on current research, and work in small groups to evaluate a range of children's books based on the tools provided.




HOTEL MAP
