


Michael J. Tougias

has spoken to companies and organizations such as General Dynamics, Raytheon, Massachusetts School Library



Barbara Foorman, Ph.D.

Barbara Foorman, Ph.D., is the Frances Eppes Professor of Education, Director Emeritus of the Florida Center for Reading Research, and Director of the Regional Educational Laboratory Southeast at Florida State University. Dr. Foorman is an internationally known expert in reading and was Commissioner of the National Center for Education Research at the Institute of Education Sciences during 2005. She has authored over 150 publications and was co-editor of the Journal of Research on Educational Effectiveness and co-founder and on the board of the Society for Research on Educational Effectiveness. She has been on national consensus panels in reading, chaired the IES Practice Guide panel on Foundational Reading Skills in Support of Reading for Understanding in Kindergarten Through 3rd Grade, and has extensive experience conducting large-scale, multi-site projects on federal grants and contracts.



Sarah Lerner

Sarah Lerner is an English teacher, Journalism teacher, and yearbook adviser at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida. She began teaching in 2002 and was named the Sun-Sentinel High School Journalism Teacher of the Year in 2014. Sarah lives in Florida with her husband and two children. Sarah edited the book Parkland Speaks: Survivors from Marjory Stoneman Douglas Share Their Stories. In this book, Sarah and the students of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School share their emotional journeys that began on February 14, 2018, and continue today. This revealing and unfiltered look at teens living in the wake of tragedy is a poignant representation of grief, anger, determination, healing, and hope.

Preconference Institute #1:

K-12 Literacy coaching for transdisciplinary multisensory instruction

Legacy North 2

ABSTRACT:

Proficient learners are transdisciplinary literate and real life problem solving requires transdisciplinarity. Are we coaching teacher-colleagues so that disciplinary concepts and skills become interconnected and interdependent? Are we coaching so that core disciplines (science, mathematics, social studies, language arts) are used as tools for strategic thinking or subjects to deposit content? During this interactive session, participants will explore and reflect on transdisciplinary language utilizing multisensory (visual, auditory, kinesthetic, tactile) instruction to support K-12 students in becoming transdisciplinary literate. Participants will investigate the instructional implications for supportive and responsive transdisciplinary multi-sensory instruction and leave with a year-long plan for coaching teacher colleagues to refine transdisciplinary practices in their classrooms.

PRESENTER:

Enrique A. Puig, has a Bachelor's of Science in Elementary Education, Master's of Science in Educational Leadership, and Doctorate of Education in Curriculum and Instruction with a focus on low-progress adolescent readers (grades 4-12). Enrique is the Director of the UCF Morgridge International Reading Center and former Director of the Florida Literacy and Reading Excellence project at UCF; a multi-million dollar grant charged with providing statewide professional learning opportunities in Florida. He currently teaches graduate and undergraduate K-12 content area reading and diagnostic reading courses at UCF. He is also the 2019-

20 Florida Literacy Association Immediate Past-Chair. Additionally, Enrique is the Professor in Residence at a school supporting teacher candidates in their junior and senior internship.

Enrique taught 24 years in Orange County Public Schools, Florida and has worked with numerous school districts from the U.S. Virgin Islands to Washington. He is a former Reading Recovery® teacher, Early Literacy In-service Course (ELIC) facilitator, Literacy Learning In Four-Eight (LLiFE) facilitator, Frameworks K-8 facilitator and Literacy Collaborative trainer. He is author of Guided Reading and Spanish Speaking Students (Scholastic) and co-author of The Literacy Coach: Guiding in the Right Direction, 2ed. (Allyn & Bacon/Pearson) and The Literacy Leadership Team: Sustaining and Expanding Success (Allyn & Bacon/Pearson). As a classroom teacher, Enrique was recognized as a Title I Distinguished Educator by the Florida Department of Education and continues to work with students to further his knowledge of learning and teaching. Enrique has presented nationally and internationally on intentional and coherent K-12 literacy acquisition, instruction, and coaching in Austria, Canada, Denmark, England, Finland, Hungary, Ireland, New Zealand, Puerto Rico, Scotland, South Africa, Sweden, Spain, Wales, and throughout the United States with a focus on the role of the literacy/instructional coach in improving transdisciplinary multi-sensory literacy acquisition and instruction.

Preconference Institute #2

Innovative Practices to Support Student Well-Being to Enhance Academic Outcomes Legacy South 1

ABSTRACT:

Administrators in Bay District Schools, in partnership with their local Children's Advocacy Center, have developed practices to achieve academic achievement for all students. Students were identified who have historically had high truancy rates, a high number of discipline referrals and/or poor academic performance. When disciple referrals were studied, it was determined that close to 90% of the discipline referrals were generated from 10% of the student population. This population of students was found in need of wraparound services to address a number of social and emotional issues, overwhelmingly related to exposure to trauma. To help support these intervention services, students and educators also received education on the effects of trauma and methods to facilitate healing and educational success for these students.

PRESENTERS:

Lori Allen is the Executive Director of the Gulf Coast Children's Advocacy Center and has served the agency in such capacity since 2011. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics and Master of Science in Public Health. She began her career in child welfare with the Department of Children and Families in 2006 and left the agency as the Training Director for the 2nd and 14th Judicial Circuit responsible for the development of all child safety staff within the area from Panama City to Tallahassee. She is a certified Child Welfare Trainer by the University of South Florida and is a subject matter expert in the field of family violence and trauma informed care.

J Dia Green-Jones is a Graduation Coach and ESE Coordinator at J R Arnold High School in Panama City Beach, FL. Prior, she was the Behavior and Title 1 coordinator and a classroom teacher at Jinks Middle School, a Title 1 school. Ms. Green has been in Education for the last 14 years. She holds a BS in Economics from Florida A & M University and a MS in Curriculum, Instruction, and Technology from Nova Southeastern University. Ms. Green is a Doctoral Candidate at Florida A & M University. Her research interests include



standardized testing, minority achievement, and educational equity. J Dia is involved in many community and national civic and educational organizations.

Britt Smith is the Principal of J. R. Arnold High School and has served in that capacity since February 2019. Prior to that, Mr. Smith served as the principal of several middle schools and special purpose schools as well as serving as a district-level administrator. He holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education from Florida State University and a Master of Education in Educational Leadership from the University of Central Florida. He began his career as a special education teacher in Orange County, Florida in 1986. Britt obtained his first assistant principalship in 1992 and become a school principal the following year. Throughout his professional career, Britt has served on numerous district and state committees.

Michael Petty is the assistant principal of Deer Point Elementary School in Panama City, Florida. Prior, he was an administrator at Jinks Middle School and a classroom ELA/Reading teacher for 13 years. Mr. Petty holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mass Media Communications from Florida State University and a Master of Education in Educational Leadership from the University of West Florida. He serves on the boards of the Bay County Reading Association, Florida Literacy Association, and is a Guardian ad Litem volunteer.

Preconference Institute #3

Evidence-Based Practices for Writing Instruction for Elementary and Secondary Students Legacy South 2

ABSTRACT:

The Evidence-Based Practices for Writing Instruction for Elementary and Secondary Students workshop will provide participants with the opportunity to examine evidence-based writing practices which will enable them to utilize these resources to improve student writing performance. Participants will engage in activities that will encourage student participation and support the development of writing skills.

PRESENTERS:

Dr. Angie Davis is known for her research interests in at-risk students, adolescent depression, instructional strategies, and social studies education. Dr. Davis currently teaches elementary social studies methods courses at Florida State University.

Dr. Arzu Leushuis is known for her research interests in reading comprehension strategies, attitudes towards reading, and active learning. She currently teaches courses in reading, literacy assessment, differentiating instruction, and cross-cultural communication for foreign/second language teachers at Florida State University.

Ms. Laura Snyder is known for her research and teaching experience related to writing instruction. Ms. Snyder worked for the Florida Center for Reading Research for five years before beginning her teaching career. She has taught fourth- and fifth-grade Reading and Language Arts in both Tallahassee and Altamonte Springs. She is currently in her 10th year of teaching.

Getting to the Heart of Literacy: Integrating Social Emotional Learning into Literacy Instruction

Legacy South 3

ABSTRACT:

Social Emotional Learning has become an educational "buzz word." It is important to understand that the set of core principles on which Social Emotional Learning (SEL) is based is essential for our students, but is not an "add on" to an already overflowing agenda. SEL is best when woven into the fabric of how our students learn to read and write as well as how they respond to literature and each other. Literacy is, at its heart, both a social and an emotional transaction. This session builds on the SEL core competencies from the Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning (CASEL) and links those competencies directly to specific best practices in literacy, including but not limited to student choice, classroom discussion, self-reflection and self-assessment, and competency building (Yoder, 2014). Participants will engage in interactive lessons that utilize teaching practices which exemplify how we can focus on SEL while simultaneously providing rich literacy instruction. Additionally, participants will experience a lesson then reflect on how to create classrooms communities in which students work together, push each other's thinking, and respond in thoughtful ways, all while interacting with literature and expository texts. Recent events have emphasized the need to continually build classroom cultures supportive of all learners in socially responsible environments. To do this effectively, teachers must be aware of how often their daily instruction incorporates diverse texts, be equipped to evaluate texts in a sound way, and be able to implement effective instruction that strengthens reading and writing through the use of diverse texts. This session will provide the tools necessary to evaluate texts based on current research and best-practice strategies. Participants will review and reflect on current research, and work in small groups to evaluate a range of children's books based on the tools provided.

PRESENTERS:

Sheila Roberts-Veatch has over 30 years experience as a classroom teacher, state assessment project manager, governmental education liaison, and district literacy coordinator. Her work in international schools (Papua New Guinea and Kenya) provided experience in the application of literacy strategies in multilingual and multicultural classroom settings. Sheila holds a BS in Elementary Education from Florida State University and an Ed.M. in Early Childhood Education from the University of South Florida.

Claire Riddell has served as a classroom teacher, school- and district-based instructional coach, and assistant in research at Florida State University. She received her MEd in Elementary Education at the University of Oregon. Time travel used to be the Professor's favorite theory.

And he's not so crazy about it any more.

Florida's Pre-History

After narrowly escaping a hungry Megalodon, the Professor encounters Florida's earliest settlers, the Native Americans.

The First Floridians

The Professor moves deeper into *Hidden History*, interacting with a member of the Timucua tribe and learning more about the perils our earliest settlers faced, both from the land and from across the sea.

The Seminole Wars

The Professors waits out the 1703 British siege on St. Augustine in the depths of the Castillo de San Marcos. After successfully proving a time-travel theory, he moves forward to the 1830s and into the events leading to the Seminole Wars.

The Frontier Years

The Professor continues to move through the mid-1800s. In this chapter he learns of the horrors of the frontier era—Yellow Fever and the Civil War— and of the life-changing invention of Panhandle physician, Dr. John Gorrie.

Spanish-American War

Set during the Spanish-American War, Stephen Crane's "The Open Boat" is considered by many to be the finest example of realism in an American short story. The Professor experiences Mr. Crane's being shipwrecked off of Florida's East Coast which prompted him to write the story.

Florida's Lighthouses

The Professor has learned that in Florida, "It's all about water." While lighthouses are romantic destinations for tourists, life for the keepers was filled with loneliness and danger.

Barefoot Mailmen

In South Florida's early years, mail was delivered by a group of brave, often barefooted, men. The Professor interacts with real-life mailman Ed Hamilton, and learns not only about his life, but of his mysterious death.

The Great Freeze

1894 was a desperate time in Florida's history. A tiny bouquet of orange blossoms is credited for the expansion of Henry Flagler's FEC railroad and the evolution of tiny Fort Dallas into present-day Miami.

Three Titans

Three of our nation's top industrialists, Henry Flagler, Thomas Alva Edison, and Henry Ford, had homes in Florida. Their impact on our state is explored as the Professor's visits these men at their various estates.

Florida during WWI

Florida's wide, hard-packed beaches played an invaluable part in training our nation's first pilots for combat. The Professor meets the first woman to fly in Florida, and the Army's one and only female pilot, Ruth Law.

Boom and Bust

The Professor experiences firsthand the thrills of the Florida Land Boom and the heartache of the Bust.

WWII & Blackout

Few states were as directly affected by World War II as Florida. The Professor meets a family from the era and learns how they coped with the challenges of both blackouts and rationing.

Segregation

Thanks to the friendship of a young African-American local, the Professor experiences life before the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Above & Beyond

The United States Space Program had a huge effect on Florida's economy and growth. Now the Professor has the opportunity to return to the present... but will he?
