



Institute 1

Inquiry-based learning and the Makerspace of the Mind: Effective Strategies for Creating New Knowledge while Engaging Students

Forum East 3 (6-12)

Kevin Baird, chairman, Center for College & Career Readiness

In this research-driven, highly interactive institute, the presenters will coach participants in leading their schools towards authentic inquiry-based learning. Participants engage in gap analysis, and then plan together best practices to incorporate literacy interventions, addressing environmental and psycho-social needs of students, and including collaborative exploration of concepts. The result is a "Makerspace of the Mind" – schools where students are producing their own authentic works while accelerating literacy skills. Participants walk away with a set of resources, template and tools for immediate use in their schools. Leaders leave better able to answer the questions: What do classrooms look like and sound like when students are learning using the very best practices and resources for College & Career Readiness? What are the critical gaps to look for and the critical coaching strategies and alignment to use with teachers?

Institute 2

Less Pain, More Gain: What Research Says We Can Do to Teach Everyone to Write Forum West 1 (K-5, admin)

Jim Cunningham, professor emeritus, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

There is a treasure chest out there, just waiting to be discovered. Those of us who are committed to teaching all students to write well know what the challenges are. Some students resist writing at all or refuse to write more than a few sentences. Some students' papers routinely contain multiple errors on mechanics and language conventions. Some students seem unable to write opinion pieces or informative/explanatory writing that comes close to meeting grade-appropriate standards. Yet, surprisingly, there exists a trove of writing research with practical implications for solving each of these challenges and others besides. In this Institute, you will learn specific lesson frameworks for teaching various aspects of writing along with practical tips for getting the lessons to work in your classroom or school.

Institute 3

Grammar Matters: Growing a Love of Language & Embedding Instruction into Daily Practice

Do you struggle to provide appropriate grammar instruction to your students with the context of writing workshop? In this institute participants will learn from Lynn Dorfman and Diane Dougherty will demonstrate strategies for teaching grammatical concepts in writing classrooms that champion correctness. A clear rationale for embedding grammar within units of student and connections to the common core will be presented throughout the institute. Participants will discover ways to introduce, practice, and reinforce the teaching of conventions. The presenters will include practical lessons for immediate classroom application. In addition, they will share multiple mentor text samples useful for teaching parts of speech and will highlight a few lessons using those texts.

An Rx for Writing Success

Writing is like baking a cake; before you begin, you need all of the ingredients that go into the finished piece. This session will provide participants with a variety of hands-on lessons and activities for each of the 6 traits of writing: conventions, ideas, word choice, sentence fluency, organization, and voice. Learn strategies that will assist you in

Text-Based Writing Make-N-Take: Evidence-based Practices, Routines and Strategies Aligned to the K-5 Classroom

The four recommendations published in "Teaching Elementary School Students to Be Effective Writers" by The Institute of Education Sciences (IES) will materialize into this Make-N-Take. These practical resources are aligned to ELA standards which call for students to write from sources. Your students will be able to gather relevant information and refer to their sources smoothly. They'll be able to use transitional strategies, elaboration techniques, tools for revising and editing, precise language and academic vocabulary. They will know various essay structures and understand the difference between quoting and paraphrasing. Lastly, your students will learn data tracking resources so they can monitor and take ownership of their own learning. These best practices, strategies, and routines, can be implemented in the classroom tomorrow!

Institute 6

Universal Design for Learning (UDL)

Legacy South 2 (K-12)

Just Read, Florida! Staff

Participants will deepen their knowledge of the three UDL principles, learning styles, barriers to learning and the faux-flipped classroom. Participants will gain knowledge of free resources that will help them train instructional staff on three principles of UDL as well as practical tools they can share instructional staff that can be implemented right away in classrooms. Participants will also analyze classroom scenarios to hypothesize what barriers to learning might exist for students with various learning styles and develop a list of ways the given activities could be universally designed to provide access to the activity for all learners. Participants will work collaboratively to design a lesson that incorporates the three main UDL principles, given a LAFS and Social Studies Next Generation Sunshine State Standard. The session will end with participants creating an implementation plan for promoting the use of UDL in their perspective districts.

Institute 7

Literacy Coaching to Improve Instruction Across Multiple Tiers of Intervention

Enrique A. Puig, director, Morgridge International Reading Center at UCF

Research shows that "teachers" make the biggest difference in students' education. Consequently, supporting teacher-colleagues will have a positive impact on student learning. This highly interactive institute will promote professional conversations, refine our understanding of literacy learning as a process, hone observation skills, and analyze data to improve literacy acquisition and instruction across multiple tiers of intervention. Grounded in data analysis, video recorded lessons will be used to prompt effective and efficient coaching conversations and professional reading. This institute aims to update our professional learning vocabulary to upgrade our thinking about instruction, reading, texts, and coaching. Attendees will develop a common language, refine their understanding of literacy learning as a process, revisit literacy coaching on a continuum of professional learning, and employ a variety of coaching conversations for multiple levels of instruction
